doing when we get there; that's why we're doing the planning on Sunday the 13th at the Access Arts Weaving Studio at noon.

CWSG Minutes - Feb. 15, 2022

The regular meeting of the Columbia Weavers and Spinners Guild was held in person and via Zoom on February 15, 2022, at 6:30pm, Deb Wilson presiding, Dyan Pursell handling Zoom connections, and Jan Berry taking minutes.

Deb welcomed everyone and called the meeting to order.

Deb asked if there were any additions or changes to the January minutes or the Treasurer's report, which were both published in The Tie-Up. There were none. Tricia Kaufmann moved to approve both documents. Susan Burpo seconded; motion passed.

Deb gave a special thank you to Dyan and Ginny Wallace for the programs this year.

Deb reported that the annual Board meeting was held January 29, 1:00pm, at Bethel Church and on Zoom, and that much work was accomplished. One item was that the Board decided to send out a survey about HES and whether to have it this year. This survey is only about HES

in November 2022. She encouraged everyone to fill in the survey when it arrives, and to fill it in honestly.

Dyan shared a couple of letters from the 1950s: one on thin rice paper from 1950 about 4 CWSG members taking a road trip to Ashland to visit people there who had looms, and then unsuccessfully trying to find Rock Bridge Park on the way back; the other was from 1955, talking about the first day the Jefferson City bridge was open, and how the CWSG group traveled to visit a member who lived there, and who greeted them wearing a sari.

75th Anniversary Committee:

Debbie Schluckebier reported that 501 postcards about the April 1st celebration would be mailed out (not to the membership, however), and she also gave out postcards to members at the meeting to share as they would like. She also had the original two archival member books to view, and also had copies of the regular member books available for sale, for \$10.00. She then showed us the new banner.

Youth Fiber Arts:

Cindy Kilfoyle said that the Youth Fiber Arts group was partnering with the Columbia Arts League. She asked that people contact her to volunteer.

Maggie Walter announced that people interested in participating in the Book Bag Project would meet on Monday, February 21, from 11:00am – 5:00pm. She also welcomes donations of fabric, thread, books, cash etc.

Show and Tell commenced both in person and through a Zoom slide show that Jenny Chicone put together.

Ginny Wallace moved to close the meeting; Jean Williams seconded.

The Program was given by Jane Dunnewald: "The Committee, Critic, and Judge: how to neutralize their influence and learn to love your work."
