# If you Like Facebook, We need your help . . .

Want to be part of a committee to get CWSG happenings up and running on Facebook? The guild has a dedicated page, but it has never really gotten off the ground. We discussed this at our recent board meeting, and decided we need a group to work on putting our page together and keeping it updated. And now we're looking for volunteers.

I explained the difference between a page (has its own url so you can direct people to it easily, administrators keep it updated regularly and make sure the information is correct and appropriate) and a group (which has subscribers who can post and discuss topics, etc.). Pages are the ones you can "Like," and are more official representations for organizations. CWSG's group is quite active,

and is a great resource for guild members, but it doesn't work so well for outreach to non-members, and a central location to check for information. The most important difference is that you can't easily publicize the url to others as you can with a page. But for now I'm hoping three or four people will agree to be administrators and work with me to finalize the page, and agree to be a fairly regular poster to keep the site fresh. I don't think it will take more than an email "meeting" and a couple of hours work to get the page running, and I'm imagining four people, each posting something once a month or so, so that we have at least a weekly update.


#### **Book Review**

Kandys Bleil

Glasbrook, Kirsten. <u>Tapestry Weaving</u>. England: Search Press, 2002, 96pp.

I decided I wanted to try my hand at tapestry weaving earlier this summer so went and checked out every book I could find on the topic. Head and shoulders above all the rest was this book by Kirsten Glasbrook. I went to Amazon because it seemed like something I'd want to own and found

that the original printing was long gone, but that another issue was due to be released in December of this year. I'm not sure if it is just a reprint, or more, but I'll certainly be looking to see which is it.



The pictures are outstanding and clearly show

how to begin and progress thru a sampler using a variety of tapestry techniques. I believe the book could be used to teach children - it's that clear! She also includes instructions for building a small frame loom. After you finish your sampler, there are other designs to try, and then pictures of some of her works that are on display in famous places in England.

The book is written as a workbook for beginners. I believe it could even be used to nurture children through the process.

Kirsten trained as a weaver in Denmark where she was born. After moving to London in the 1960's she spent time restoring antique tapestries while teaching part time at the Bath Academy of Art. She is still active running workshops and classes for both adults and children. Using mainly wool, linen and cotton, she designs and weaves tapestries, often with a mythological, mystical or meditative theme.

I would recommend this book as a Go-To for anyone interested in trying their hand at tapestry weaving.
