Flesberg Workshop

Ten Guild members participated in the Flesberg weaving workshop April 23-24, taught by Katharine Dickerson. We learned that this style of weaving was practiced in a small area in Norway from the 1850s to the 1920s. Flesberg is a dense, weft faced weave using three shafts used for blankets. It is a surprisingly complex weave (as many of us discovered), yielding beautiful patterns.

Article Review

"Flesberg Bound Weave System," by Katherine Dickerson. Norwegian Textile Letter, Vol. XII, No. 2, February 2006.

In this well-illustrated article Katherine Dickerson presents a wealth of information about Flesberg Weaving, a three-harness tradition from southwest Norway dating back to the 1800s. She starts with a description of the preserved remnants of this weave structure. The history of this type of weaving and its uses are described. Bedcovers were the primary item made, but as they wore

their use changed to seating covers and eventually horse blankets.

Dickerson goes on to describe how the modern Flesberg Farm Women's Organization researched and documented the historical materials. Ms. Dickerson, familiar with and sensitive to the ownership of such information by indigenous groups uses her own approach to present the weave. She delves into the conceptual and structural nature of these unique three-shaft patterns. Comparisons and contrasts with the better-known Krokbragd style of weaving allows the reader to visualize the more fluid or less blocky structure of Flesberg when compared to Krokbragd.

The illustrations help explain the influence of the three shafts and the threading on the creation of patterns. Especially useful are the draw downs that show the angles formed in Flesberg and how these subtle interactions between picks allows the patterns to have more flow. They also reinforce the description of making directional changes when shifting from one pattern to another.

Anyone interested in pattern weaving will enjoy this article and Katherine Dickerson's descriptions of her understanding and use of Flesberg Weaving.



Loom for Sale

J-Made 60" Gorgeous Cherry Loom

This lovely loom has 8 shafts and room for more. It was custom built by Dale Johnston.

I chose this beauty because of the treadling ease. It has 10 treadles, each with a small wheel, which rolls to facilitate movement. The treadle lock across the front allows the weaver to, with a slight sideways motion of the foot, lock the treadle in the lifted position. This maintains the shed with no pressure from the weaver's leg and foot. Worm gears allow for perfect tension. Breast and back beams are removable to facilitate threading. It comes with the original beater and a fly shuttle equipped beater, fly shuttle bobbin and pirns, 3 stainless steel reeds (5, 8, 15 dent), lease sticks, and a matching open ended storage bench.
