Book Report

My book report is on the book <u>The Crocheter's</u> <u>Companion</u> by Nancy Brown.

As the title suggests, this book is a great companion for crocheters of any skill level. It includes information about the tools needed for crochet, how to read crochet written instructions and charts, tutorials on a wide variety of basic and advanced crochet stitches, an introduction to Tunisian crochet, decorative finishing, finishing techniques, and troubleshooting common problems.

Each section of the book is surprisingly comprehensive when considering that this is not a large book. In fact, the book is small in comparison to many craft books, and it is bound with a covered wire spiral so it is easy to use while actually working on a project.

Personally, my favorite part of the book is the table of contents. All of the information is laid out in a manner that when I need a quick reference guide, I can easily find page number for the specific piece of information i am looking for. Such information may be a chart explaining yarn label symbols, a walkthrough on how to make a popcorn stitch, a reminder of the difference between a front and back post double crochet, different ways to crochet a button hole, or how to best block a project depending on the type of project and the content of the yarn. The ease of presentation and organization of the book, as well as the variety of information, makes this the crochet book I have gotten the most use out of since I first learned to crochet.



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Jurying Survival 101

"We may not want to be critiqued, but if we want to continue to grow as artists, we need to be critiqued." Pete Pinnell, "Surviving a critique," Clay Times, May/June 2006.

This is the first of a two part article about the jurying process. The first focuses on the one being juried, the second pertains to jurors.

As the coordinator of the jurying process for the guild Holiday and Exhibition Sale, I want to make our jurying process a valuable experience for both the juried and the juror. Remember, jurying is good for us as artists.

Here are a few suggestions:

1. Art is juried, not the artist.

Keep in mind your work is being juried, not you. Inspiration, time, effort, and creation all come from you, no doubt there. But the juror judges the work for itself. Be open and willing to listen.

2. Don't be defensive.

Sometimes there might be a temptation to make excuses or become a little testy or even teary. It becomes hard to concentrate on comments. Bite your tongue, breathe deep, and take notes.

3. There's always room for improvement.

Keep in mind all serious artists will have their work juried at some time. A comment or suggestion can spark a whole avenue of inspiration. As a result, an artist's work might change in technique or finish, which elevates the original piece to a higher level.

4. Chin up!

Why is it that ten positive comments will be ignored by the juried artist, but one negative comment will be remembered forever? Solution: Repeat or read aloud the positive comments five times, the negative only once. The positive will become more significant and build confidence.

5. Figure it out.

Put the suggestions and comments to work. Evaluate them - how would they make your work better? Do they require starting over or making improvements in finishing or technique in a piece?

Jurying makes our art better. It is healthy and can be a positive and encouraging force. Next month Jurying Survival 101 will discuss the characteristics of an effective juror.





HES Levels of Participation

Level 1 - Steering Committee Member - 12% commission rate, \$20 fee

Steering Committee chairpersons:

Accept responsibility of overseeing one of the committees through the entire year.

See that all duties and responsibilities of their committee have been completed.

Attend Steering Committee meetings.

Work three shifts of the event weekend.

Level 2 - Active Participation – Returning Participants: 20% commission rate, \$20 fee New HES participants: 20% commission, \$10 fee

Includes all other HES participants, regardless of the number of inventory items.

Level 2 Participants:

- Accept responsibility for an integral portion of committee work, including pre-sale work.
- Perform their expected committee work duties.
- Work three shifts of the event weekend.

Level 3 – One-Item Participation – 20% commission rate, no fee

All Guild members are invited to submit *one* item to offer for sale in the gallery. This item will be juried for the same criteria as other sale levels. No participation fee is required. A 20% commission will be deducted from the price of any item sold. This level is to encourage more members to participate and to display the artwork and talents of as many Guild members as possible.

All Levels

Event participants:

- Attend New Participant Meeting if less than two years of prior HES participation.
- Attend the All-Participant Meetings.
- Complete a pre-sale job.
- Respond to email messages in a timely manner.
- Follow HES guidelines, rules, and deadlines.
- Perform expected committee work duties.
- Sign up for required work shifts during the event. (This occurs at the Fall All-Participant Meeting. The number of work shifts each person needs to sign up for depends upon the total number of participants each year.)
- Work one Friday shift, either the morning set-up <u>or</u> the evening reception and sale.
- Work one shift on Saturday and one shift on Sunday.
- If there are reasons you cannot work the required weekend shifts, contact the Steering Committee in advance to arrange substitute tasks.
- Accept decisions of the Steering Committee regarding quality control, jurying, price recommendations, commission rates, and job assignments.
- Donate two door prizes.
