Book Review

Over the summer I have read two books that I found fascinating. The Weaving Explorer and the Golden Thread.

The Weaving Explorer (Ingenious Techniques, Accessible Tools, and Creative Projects withYarn, Paper, Wire, & More) by Deborah Jarchow & Gwen W. Steege, Storey Publishing, 2019, ISBN 9781635860283. The first chapter's title is "It's a Woven World". That says it all. The books contains a myriad of items and projects. Here are three of the chapter titles: Weaving on Frames; Tapping into Tapestry; and Rock, Paper, Ribbon. The appendix has sections on Six Knots for Weavers and Commonly Use Materials. There is a glossary and a metric conversion chart. The photographs are exceptional and the project directions are easy to understand. The authors spotlight the artists who contributed to the book. The book provides much inspiration to try new techniques.

The Golden Thread (How Fabric Changed History) by Kassia St. Clair, Liverright Publishing Corporation, 2019, ISBN 9781631494802. This is a fascinating book. It covers linen, flax, wool, cotton, silk, rayon, polyesters and even spider silk. She covers early spinning and weaving and how archeologists discover the use of fabric with the tools found and imprints made. She speaks to the guilds of the Middle Ages and trading routes include the silk roads. She also delves into the creation of fabric for special uses like space suits, Olympic swimming,

mountain climbing, Antarctic exploration. She briefly covers the environmental impacts of various fibers. Most fascinating was the chapter on spider silk—there is research on harvesting and trying to emulate spider silk. I enjoyed the book—I found it hard to put down.

This short video shows a very old form of intricate weaving used for obi, the wide belt worn with a kimono. It is a wefted-faced form of weaving that they call brocade, but to me it looks like tapestry. A 2-harness floor loom is used. The beautiful shades of silk yarn are placed with small boat shuttles and beaten down with small wooden combs or a fingernail that has small grooves sanded into it!

Verna Wulfekammer Memorial Trust

For the past several months, Susan Burpo, Wulfekammer Trust Correspondent, has been compiling all the past grant requests and documentation. Some interesting statistics: since the first grant was awarded in March of 1996, the Trust has disbursed approximately 170 grants valued at about \$121,000.

That's money supporting people learning about fiber arts. Because of Covid-19, many classes, workshops, and conferences have been cancelled and learning opportunities have mostly moved online. Online classes are great opportunities to grow in our crafts even while social distancing. During our recent meeting, we brainstormed about possible sources of online classes. The library committee plans to meet in September to plan next steps in making the library accessible to Guild members in a safe manner. Watch the October Tie-Up for updates.


